Congratulations to the State of Maryland leadership for recognizing that the way forward to reforming and advancing primary health care is to improve the health of Marylanders and reduce costs. This project includes a diverse array of primary care practices with a shared philosophy and belief in accessible, coordinated, continuous, comprehensive high quality health care.

The Maryland Learning Collaborative will support the primary care practice community

by offering educational and logistical support to transform into patient centered medical homes. Offering care management as a key strength, the goal of improved chronic disease management and preventive care can be realized. Health Information Technology support will be offered by our partner CRISP health through the Regional Extension Center and future portal access through the Health Information Exchange. Ultimately, practices will aim to develop individualized care plans for all patients identified as high risk for preventable utilization of emergency rooms and hospitalizations.

Leadership is drawn from the two academic centers, University of Maryland and Johns Hopkins, working synergistically with the Maryland Health Care Commission. A steering committee of stakeholders, along with a nurse consultant, will guide all activities germane to the Maryland Learning Collaborative.
