

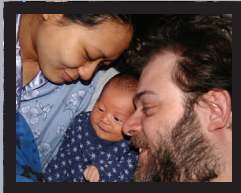


CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

The purpose is to offer specialized training to master level clinicians in knowledge, skills, and attitudes necessary to begin practicing in the field of early childhood mental health.

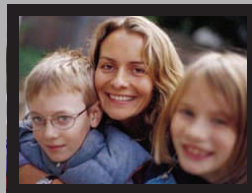
THE EARLY CHILDHOOD MENTAL HEALTH CERTIFICATE PROGRAM is in cooperation with the University of Maryland School of Medicine's Taghi Modarressi Center for Infant Study and The Maryland Child and Adolescent Mental Health Institute, Maryland State Department of Education, Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, Baltimore Mental Health Systems, Maryland Early Childhood Mental Health Steering Committee and Chesapeake College.



Faculty and staff from Kennedy Krieger, Georgetown University, Johns Hopkins University and the University of Maryland, will be the presenters.

CERTIFICATE PROGRAM enrollment involves commitment to the **entire program** on all training dates and completion of reading and online course work.

- Participants who complete the program components will receive a certificate of completion from the University of Maryland Department of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry.
- Participants successfully completing the proposed workshops, workshops activities, reading, and on-line activities will receive continuing education credits and a certificate from the University of Maryland Department of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry.
- During the course participants will have the opportunity to prepare a case analysis applicable to working with a client and demonstrating integration of material presented in the program. knowledge and skills.

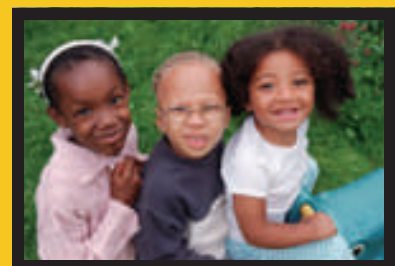

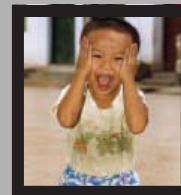
