


The data below were collected from the Connection Learning Healthcare System Hub, which consists of Coordinated Specialty Care programs in Maryland and Pennsylvania.


These data reflect Coordinated Specialty Care (CSC) service users within who have completed the admission timepoint of the Core Assessment Battery. This month's data snapshot shows information about Adverse Childhood Experiences prevalence as reported by CSC service users at admission. The sample size for this snapshot is service users who completed the Admission Core Assessment Battery from January 2021 – April 2024 and have data entered for the ACEs self report questionnaire (N = 418).

Adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) are negative experiences that happen during the first 18 years of life. These experiences are usually traumatic events.

The three types of **ACEs** include:




Number of ACEs




75.4% of the sample have experienced **at least 1 ACE**, with more than **28.2%** experiencing **4 or more ACEs**.


Demographics of the sample

Parental separation or divorce and **emotional abuse** were the most frequently reported ACEs.

Why does this matter? Young people in CSC self-report many and a range of ACEs. CSC teams can use this data to understand young people's experiences and plan treatment.
