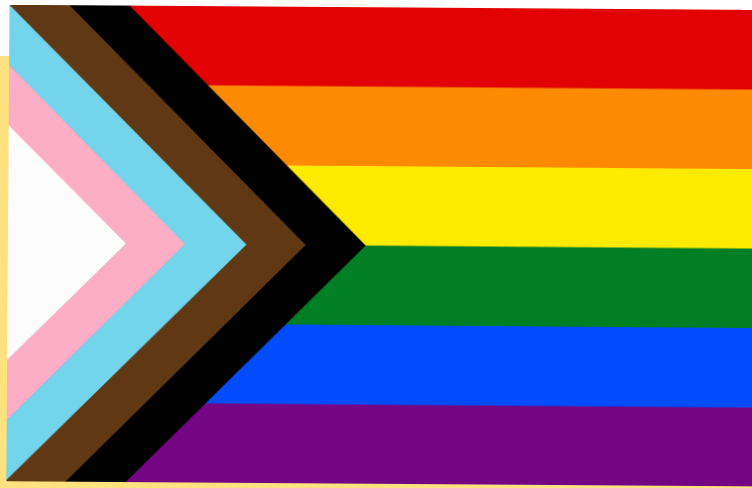

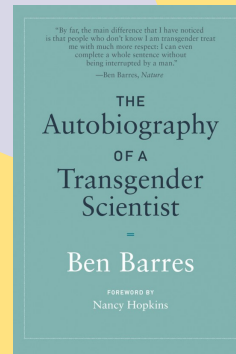

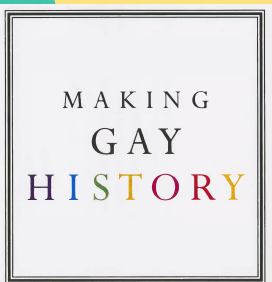
Fire Island
