## Local brands named among the nation's 400 largest franchises

Four Greater Baltimore-based franchises are among the 400 largest in the U.S. based on overall sales, according to <u>a new list from Franchise Times</u>. The highest-ranking local franchise on the list was Abingdon-based Kiddie Academy, which came in at no. 126 with more than \$624 million in

global sales, up 19 spots from its rank last year. Kiddie Academy has also been a regular on the BBJ's Fast 50 List. Other Baltimore-area brands to make the list are Annapolis-based Ledo Pizza (no. 286 with \$140 million in sales), Nottingham-based Celebree School (no. 356 with \$82 million) and Columbia-based Greene Turtle (no. 366 in its list debut with nearly \$77 million).

#### University of Maryland School of Medicine launches rural health initiative

The University of Maryland School of Medicine has launched a new rural health initiative that will train and place incoming medical students in Eastern Shore health care practices to combat a physician shortage. The inaugural class includes six current first-year medical students, with three being awarded full tuition scholarships in exchange for committing to working on the Eastern Shore for four years after completing their residency training. The program hopes to eventually support 10 students with full-tuition scholarships, according to a release. The new initiative comes as the University of Maryland Shore Regional Health is building a massive new hospital in Easton.

#### Johns Hopkins pledges to be carbon neutral by 2040

Johns Hopkins University unveiled a new sustainability plan Friday that will see it purchase all of its energy from renewable sources by 2030 and be carbon neutral by 2040, the Baltimore Sun reports. The plan has been about two years in the making and covers the Hopkins Homewood campus, the Peabody Institute in Mt. Vernon, the Applied Physics Laboratory in Laurel and the school's campus in Washington, D.C.
